Autumn 1	Landscapes	<p>The focus of the scheme of work is to reintroduce students to studying fine art and exploring the range of materials, processes and techniques that are on offer to them. This is an opportunity for students to draw on their prior knowledge and continue to develop their skills in a series of workshop style lessons. Students will be encouraged to make own decisions regarding materials and take responsibility for the presentation and completion of their work.</p> <p>Students will explore the following areas: drawing, collage, painting, printing and digital processes. Artwork and experiments will be influenced by a range of different artists. Autumn 2 and spring 1	Being human	<p>Students will complete a project based upon being human. Students will explore the theme in a wider context looking at what it means to be human how this can be represented through art.</p> <p>The scheme of work will challenge students existing skills and prior knowledge whilst developing their understanding of drawing and painting in greater depth. Students will look at drawing in more detail, exploring drawing for different purposes, working at different scales, and using different materials. Students will then progress to developing their knowledge of painting as a fine art skill, again looking at this in more depth to develop accuracy of application and skill with different materials. Students will complete the project by creating a final piece. They will reflect on their learning to choose the material/s, scale, and surface they work with.
